Real Moves towards more Community Empowerment?

We are moving into a period when – for both principled and pragmatic reasons – community empowerment is rising up the political agenda. In October we responded to the Scottish Government consultation on the proposed Renewal and Empowerment Bill; and this month we have a working group report on the future of Community Councils. Both move us along a path that Stirling Council (SC) is already further along than most and we see real potential benefits from these developments. As a result of views which we have expressed at SW Rural Forums and other community consultation sessions run by SC in October we were offered the chance to meet Stirling Chief Executive Bob Jack and Assistant CE Linda Kinney so that there could hear our view on the way we would wish our role to develop.

It was agreed that for CCs to be able to raise outside funding, employ staff and take direct responsibility for public budgets new legislation would be required. That may come, but there is still much scope for communities through their CCs to have a more significant say in prioritizing the allocation of 'residual' local authority budgets to be spent in their areas. SC are in the process of getting their own departments to work together in a more integrated way and raising service managers' awareness of local community concerns by giving each senior service manager a responsibility to oversee the whole of SC's service provision in a particular CC area.

We hope that Strathblane Community Council will be included in the trialling of this new approach by Stirling Council.

The End of the Hot Prepared Meals Service

The group who have been meeting regularly over the last year or so have now come to the end of the road. Given the small numbers taking meals in the village it is not economic to provide a hot meal service through a community business. The hot meal provision has now been withdrawn and is replaced by a fortnightly frozen meals service, provided by Wiltshire foods. The lunch club, which is open to anyone, will continue to meet weekly in the Edmonstone Hall.

It is important to us that our senior citizens and other vulnerable people have a choice in how services are provided to them and that everyone claims their full entitlement. After all this is not charity! It is only a return for your contribution in tax and in other ways over the years! Those of you who already buy Wiltshire foods can ask to be assessed to see if you qualify for a subsidy for the same service. For those who are struggling on—have you applied for attendance allowance? Couples who care for each other can apply, as can people who are on their own. This is not charity and it can make a huge difference in helping to pay for a taxi, home help or anything else that can help to improve your quality of life.

November Community Council

In this brief report we highlight major items dealt with at the November Community Council meeting. Some of these are followed up elsewhere in the Bulletin. Full minutes are available on the village website and noticeboards.

The first half of our meeting, devoted to an open session on the Draft Local Development Plan, was introduced by our Planning Correspondent John Gray. Discussion focussed on concerns over the proposal for housing in the 'Singh Field' (now 30 not 50), the related relaxation of the Green Belt boundary, and the siting of the cemetery extension.

Points were raised on possible implications - positive & negative of these developments for traffic management; on the need for proper footways on both sides of Campsie Road; and on the pros and cons of reversing the proposed siting of the new housing and the cemetery extension. The discussion exposed the difficult balance between community benefits (especially particular needs and affordable housing) and costs (including loss of Green Belt and attendant amenity) and reaffirmed the need for the community council to maintain a tight watching brief on the details of any future proposed developments to ensure that the safeguards which we and Stirling Council are concerned to impose are implemented as closely as possible.

Individuals were encouraged to make their representations to Stirling Council, and the Community Council will agree its response at the December meeting.

A **Petition** on the desperate need for footpath maintenance on the three approach roads to the villages was put into circulation and received immediate strong support.

The Chair reported on an important discussion between community council members and the CE of Stirling Council (see Page 1 report).

The **village tubs** are now all planted and we must thank the Oakwood Garden Centre for their support.

We end on a very positive note. At the November meeting we agreed to co-opt Julie Hutchison onto the Council, thus filling our remaining vacancy and - for the first time in over a decade - giving us a full complement of 12 community councillors.



There will be a **launch event in the Village Club at 7pm on Friday 7 December,** where you'll be able to buy copies of the book, hear its editors Mary Brailey and myself talk about it, enjoy drinks and nibbles, and maybe share a few 'auld tales' together. The book will also be on sale at various places in the village and via the village website.

'A Century of Change' follows hard on the heels of the brilliant 'Now and Then' photograph book from Anne Johnstone and Martin Shields. We hope that 'Now and Then' will have whetted your appetite to find out even more about past times in our community!

'A Century of Change' was originally researched and written by Alison Dryden, who was a keen local historian and one of the Heritage

Society's founder members. Sadly Alison died before she could get the book published. But the Society decided to pursue the project, with the blessing of her brother Michael. We are delighted to be able to publish the book at last, edited and complete with illustrations and index.

Reading through these chapters – whether they're about the printworks, the railway, our churches, the village doctors, the school, housing, social life, or village life in wartime – I start to appreciate all over again how much our living conditions have improved within the space of a generation, but also how well our community continually adapted during the economic and social ups and downs of those years.
