Strathendrick Care Home — the battle begins!

Our local Stirling Councillors along with your Community Council have stopped the closure and sale of Strathendrick Care Home — for the time being. Stirling Council were planning to use the money from the sale of the home to help fund a centralised Stirling Care Village to be created on the site of the Old Stirling Infirmary. This was to take place without any local consultation.

At their December meeting however, the Council have now accepted unanimously a motion from Cllr Berrill that:

1. Strathendrick will not close for as long as any of the current long-term residents want to continue living there.
2. Strathendrick will not close unless and until the Council (i.e., councillors) are satisfied that adequate provision (whether Strathendrick or an acceptable alternative) is in place for rural areas.

We acknowledge that the provision of care services is changing with long term care being replaced with the need for nursing home provision. The integration of social care and health (see page 2) aims to help people stay at home for longer.

All community councils in the catchment area have now received an apology and and we have been briefed by senior staff. A small group has been formed which includes Marian Lever and Grace Edmonds from SCC to help shape services for our area.

There is a now a real opportunity that Strathendrick will evolve into a 'care hub' for this part of the Stirling Council area. We will try to achieve a pattern of service provision that means carers and friends do not have far to travel to support individuals needing a bed for assessment or re-enablement. It would also be good to have a more local MECS team to provide a quicker response when individuals call for help. Strathendrick could provide assessment beds and intermediate care beds. We think that, working together, an appropriate development of this kind could be a 'spend to save' initiative. Please get in touch if you have views.

What is in no doubt is that we will need to do more in our community to support those who need care.

Work Underway on Affordable Homes in Campsie Road



Before Christmas, in the presence of Strathblane PS children, Community Councillors, Cllr Lambie and officials from Rural Stirling Housing Association the ceremonial turf-breaking for the building of 14 affordable houses to rent on Campsie Road was carried out by local resident and founder member of RSHA David Froud who said:

“Strathblane was one of the priority areas for new homes when the association was established (25 years ago) but it was always difficult to find an affordable site. It is great we have finally managed to get there in close consultation with the Community Council. These homes will be a village asset.”

Community Council January Update — from SCC Chair Margaret Vass

Our December and January meetings focussed on Stirling Council's **Priority Based Budgeting (PBB)** and **Social Care and Health Integration** highlighting how the important issues involved will impact on our community.

The CC's PBB response is on the village website but here are some highlights. Despite its potential to engage and empower communities we felt last year that proposals lacked deal and were concerned that Councillors were required to vote on options whose impact on citizens was unclear. This year again the bland language is back and the bad news hidden. For 'modernisation' and 'transformation' we must too often read 'job loss' and 'service reduction'. The current process was set to save £25m over 5 years but recent local government cuts mean that further £4.99m must come off this year's budget. Further consultation will now take place (see below).

We have supported changes to waste services—the introduction of a 7-day service and increased recycling. The need to retain the Balfron Depot was highlighted. Whilst not opposed in principle to a proposal to move libraries into other council-owned buildings our own Primary School does not currently offer the space to maintain the excellent range of library services. Childrens' Homes and facilities for long-term care are likely to be cut.

Further PBB Conversation Balfron Campus Wed Feb 3rd 6 - 7.30pm Further SG cuts mean Stirling Council are having to make extra savings. Proposals will be published on the council website, along with a survey by the end of January. Community councils & resident's then have an opportunity to discuss the options with senior management.

The CC has now responded to the **draft strategic plan for social care and health integration** which was summarised in the November BVB. We agree with its main aim of developing a person-centred approach to meet the needs of individuals, minimising the need to go to hospital and supporting people to stay safe, healthy and well at home. There is not enough detail to allow a proper assessment of the effectiveness of implementing the plan especially in rural areas. The development of a Stirling Care Village offering intermediate care between home and hospital is in itself a good idea. Our strong concern, however, is that resources might be lost from the the rural areas to help fund it. The Strathendrick Care Home is under review (see Page 1).

Early intervention and prevention is good and we suggested more information on preventive strategies such as encouraging a more active lifestyle would be welcome. The plan proposes that service users are supported to self-manage and plan care proactively giving individuals choice and control, but that kind of self-management may be significantly limited in rural areas by the limited range of services available. Equality of access across urban and rural areas is essential. Lack of transport in rural areas causes difficulties with accessing hospital appointments and getting home in a reasonable time frame. There is no mention made in the plan of how to deliver palliative care and, especially important for our community, how to deal with cross border integration between the Integration Board and Greater Glasgow Health Board which is used by many in this area as access is easier, especially for emergency care and in hospital care.

The **next Community Council** meeting will be on **Monday February 1st at 7.30pm** in the Primary School. Come along and give us your views.

First Registered in December 1990 RSHA recently
celebrated the start of its 25th anniversary year with a
social event attended by current Committee and staff
members as well as some of the people who played a
key role in setting the Association up at that time.

The Association was presented with a Stirling Council
Civic Plaque by Baillie Violet Weir (the Council's Hous-
ing Portfolio Holder). Baillie Weir commended the As-
