Your Stirling. You Decide

This is Stirling's version of participatory budgeting following the Scottish Government's Community Engagement initiative which gives local people a

direct say in how a portion of Stirling's budget is spent. This year there is £700,000 to be split between the 7 council wards. That is £100,00 to be spent on infrastructure and the environment.

How will this work? The first step is a call for ideas, by 14th April 2019. Anyone living or working in the ward can submit an idea through the website; in person at a community event; or by filling in an ideas form available from any public building or Council office. The second step is a public ballot in which everyone of high school age or above who lives in the ward can take part. This will run between 27th May and 23rd June. More details about the process will be available nearer the time. Then the proposals with the most votes will be taken forward from July. Council Services will work on the winning ideas in each ward.

So get your thinking caps on as this will be a major topic at our April Community Council meeting.

Bird Boxes in Strathblane

We were approached by the Institute of Biodiversity, Animal Health and Comparative Medicine at Glasgow University about a research project studying how urbanisation modifies a classic tri-level interaction between cavity nesting songbirds (blue tits and great tits), their main caterpillar preys and the plants' leaves upon which caterpillars feed.

Preliminary work that we have done has shown that urban blue tits have to rely on alternative diets to feed their offspring, and this has severe implications for offspring physiology and survival. The lack of native trees severely hampers the abundance of caterpillars and other insects that tits use to feed their offspring, which then have to rely on alternative, less suitable (and in some cases highly harmful) diets.





The advice about feeding birds is to stop putting food our during the nesting season from April to September and only to use fatballs in the winter. The institue has permission from Stirling to put their nest boxes on public land as, during the nesting season the boxes have to be checked very often and they do not wish to disturb residents for access but, if you are interested in the project, you can monitor your own boxes. I will get the report form from the University and the information you collect can be uploaded to the project website. If you need a nest box please let a member of the Community Council know and the project will provide one for you.

Volunteering Matters: The Handyperson Service

Volunteering Matters, (formerly CVS, the UK's leading volunteering charity), is looking to expand and build capacity of its Handyperson Service (currently operating in Clackmannanshire and Greater Stirling) to include Balfron and the surrounding area. It is seeking to recruit volunteers to help older people in Balfron and surrounding area with small/minor maintenance jobs in their own homes. This includes tasks such as changing bulbs and smoke alarm batteries, rewiring plugs, putting up shelves, curtains and mirrors, assembling flat pack furniture plus many more. Volunteers do not undertake jobs that should be done by a qualified tradesperson. Being able to have these types of jobs done means our clients feel more confident of remaining independent at home for longer. Strathblane Community Council February Update

from Chair Marian Lever

This brief report will highlight the major issues discussed at our recent meeting. Some of these are followed up elsewhere in the Bulletin.

Police Report:

We were able to thank the police for their intervention with a landowner as the footpath between Ballewan Crescent and the Care Home has been cut back. Again the police reported a few issues such as minor damage to a shed within the primary school and various incidents of possessing cannabis were reported. Extra attention has been given to the school in the last few weeks and there have been no issues.

If anyone sees suspicious activity we are asked to report it as these issues are always followed up. There have been no thefts reported since the last meeting. Road checks have continued to be carried out in the village to deter travelling criminals. Hand held radar has been continuing in order to detect and deter speeding drivers. Two road accidents were reported but no injuries were sustained as a result of these accidents.

Co-op:

We heard a report about the Co-op's activities in the village such as the Veg Power initiative called Eat Them to Defeat Them. The Co-op is partnering this initiative to tackle childhood obesity. We also heard about Keep Britain Tidy which is launching the Great British Spring Clean from March 22nd till April 23rd. The Co-op is going Handyperson Service they have set up across to provide kits and promotional material. We heard about Clackmannanshire and Stirling. Interest was expressed the Eden Project initiative, The Big Lunch. Last year the Co-op supported planting in the village tubs and AH indicated that there would be support again this year. The Co-op is buying a football for Blanefield Thistle. Finally, after running a promotion for Cuppa Time in the shop a new volunteer has been enlisted.

The Participation Request:

This again resulted in a lively discussion after we reported on our last meeting of the group. After discussion we were persuded to support the scheme as suggested by the Council's expert staff but we know that this is not the end of discussions. The scheme will be implemented soon. In fact had we not asked for a meeting at the behest of residents at the last meeting the All in all it was another busy meeting. work would have already been completed. Our discussion focussed on the problem of the

roundabout on the A81 and Campsie Road which is the main crossing point for children from Braidgate. A pedestrian crossing was suggested and Rob Davies offered to raise this with the Council.

Local Health Initiative:

The meeting with various representatives of health providers and related support staff will be held in April in the Village Club. More at a future Community Council Meeting.

Neighbourhoods of Care Meeting

At the last meeting of this group there had been concern expressed about Strathendrick House. We were reassured to hear that its future was not under threat. Stirling Council had allocated £300,000 for maintenance over the next two years and it would continue to offer respite care. It is not practical to offer specialist medical care there so discharge from Larbert will be at the Bellfield Centre. The development of the facility will be a standing item on the agenda and community representatives will be fully involved in decisions. We also received an update on the main issues raised at the meeting held in the McClintock Hall in January and how these aligned with local priorities. This will inform the development of the Strategic Plan for the next three

Elected Member's report

Robert Davies told us about the new budget and its effect on both Council Tax and Council House rents, both of which will rise. He also reported on the actions Councillor Lambie was undertaking on our behalf, review of Housing in the Countryside planning policies that will go out for consultation later in the year, and that in preparation for the introduction of 1140 hours a year free nursery care for children between the ages of 3 and 5 from August 2021, there is a proposal to close the nursery at Croftamie and build a new one at Drymen where most of the children come from. The copy date for the BVB next month will be Friday 12th April.

Helping Our Elders

Tax Help for Older People

We would like to draw your attention to a service available in our area for those on lower incomes and requiring independent personal tax advice, and who cannot afford professional tax advice. The service is offered through the charity Tax Help for Older People and is generally marketed through Age UK or Citizens Advice Bureaux. If visiting one of their centres is inconvenient, home visits can be arranged.

Further information is available on the website www.taxvol.org.uk or through the helpline 01308 488 066. The helpline should be able to answer simple questions and arrange an appointment with an advisor if further help is needed. Leaflets are in the Strathblane library, giving a brief description of the types of issues that might arise with the HMRC and also the eligibility criteria. We are lucky to have one of the 450 or so expert volunteers residing in the SCC area.

Power of Attorney - Home Visits for Legal Work

As you know we recommend that everyone sets up Power of Attorney. It is a much simpler process if you are still able to decide this for yourself as it is much more difficult if family members have to do it when you are unable to do it for yourself.

Solicitors for Older People, in partnership with Age Scotland, now offer a home visit service in this area. They are also happy for you to have a friend or relative present for support. There is no extra charge for this and they will assess you for legal aid and if you qualify they will get it for you.
