FIGHTING THE FLOODS

In recent weeks we have become increasingly aware of the very local effects of global warming in the village with two incidents of localised flooding in the Station Road area of the village. One ofthese was prominently recorded both on television and in a Stirling Observer article. In the mostrecent flood not only excessive water came down but also rubble and timber. Recent work on the banks in Station Road which dealt with damage undercutting the road has not seen an end to the problem as we now have a large and dangerous hole on the other side of the main road, currently surrounded by the familiar temporary safety barriers. We live in fear of the road collapsing given the weight of some local traffic. We need action and the recent Community Council started discussions about possible actions and solutions.

As there was little time for real discussion at the recent CC meeting, the issue of flooding will be part of the formal agenda at the next meeting so that it can be dealt with earlier with plenty of time for discussion. At the meeting we were reminded about the responsibility of landowners with land adjoining the burn and their responsibility to ensure that debris does not get washed into the water and this we will follow up too.

Since the meeting it has come to the notice of the Community Council that Scottish Water is currently discharging large quantities of water into the burn from Campsie Dene and that this has significantly raised the water level, making the problems of excess runoff caused by the very heavy and localised rainfall worse. We will be contacting Scottish Water about this and will invite them to our next meeting along with the recent new appointment to Environment and Place on the Council, Bruce Reekie. The flooding is a complex problem and will demand a variety of responses. It will be a standing itemat our meetings for as long as necessary so please try to come along with ideas.

FITTING A SECURE EUROLOCK TO A PVC DOOR

Virtually all of our PVC doors and indeed some wooden ones are fitted with Eurolocks. Many of these older versions are a security risk. They can be gripped externally with a mole grip after breaking off the handle bezel to reveal the lock body, then wrenching the barrel which breaks centrally at the lock actuating lever. Access to the property can then be gained without a key. This can be done with little noise in less than a couple of minutes. A more secure version has a sacrificial slot machined into the lock which breaks leaving the remainder of the lock secure. A three star high security version is available which also resists drilling and physical attack. Fitting a new lock of either type is fairly easy. A single cross-head machine screw in the edge face of the door level with the lower part of the lock is simply unscrewed and the old lock can be slid out – insert the key and turn slightly to assist in this. A new lock can be purchased after measuring the inside and outside length of the old lock from its fixing screw hole. Measurement can also be made without removing the lock to allow you to purchase a new one in advance. Measure from handle bezel to the fixing hole on each side. Each dimension may be different so you need to get the correct length.

The new secure lock will have a slot machined on the outer portion or maybe both. Slip the new lock into the door, align the fixing hole and insert and tighten the securing machine screw. Check operation before closing the door to ensure it works freely. The high security version may have lugs on the body which will necessitate removal of the door handle bezels which is usually done by removing the two machine screws through the door which clamp them together. Measure up and insert the lock as above then replace the bezels after. Leave screws slightly slack until alignment and proper operation has been proved then finally tighten up. Strathblane Community Council February Update

from Chair Marian Lever

September meeting

Kate Ramsden was adopted as a full member of the Community now that she has served for six months. We still need three more members to bring us up to speed.

Police report: There was very little to report over the summer months, mainly road related issues. MV reported a spate of housebreakings and police activity at one house. ML will contact the police regarding this.

The full police report can be seen on the website.

Nursery. Bruce Reekie has been head of 'Environment and Place' issues with potholes, floods etc.

Planning and Licencing: Gladmann of the seen on the website.

Issues from the last meeting: The work needed to improve road safety in the village is still going to happen. Your Stirling, You Decide resulted in success for Buchlyvie and Arnprior. Strathblane did very badly as so few local residents voted. We believe that the local villages work better together and systems like this, which sets us against each other, are counterproductive.

Invasive species: Malcom McCormick from the Loch Lomond Fisheries Trust (LLFT) told us about the work he does in tackling Invasive Species. The River Blane has several rare fish species so keeping the Blane clean is a priority. Whilst discharges by Scottish Water are a worry the main issue is invasive species - giant hogweed, Japanese knotweed and Himalayan Balsam. He hopes to work with the local community on this issue and will write an article for a future edition of the BVB to outline his plans.

Feedback from Neighbourhoods of Care: Solicitors for Older People Scotland (SOPS); Adult Support and Protection; Handy person Service; Trossachs Search and Rescue partnership with HSCP Mobile Emergency care Services (MECS); Future plans for Strathendrick Care Home and Cherry Trees were all discussed at the meeting in July. Full details are available on the Website and in the public records of the minutes on our notice boards.

Telephone Boxes: The community still owns two telephone boxes purchased to house defibrillators, however Trossachs S&R advised that these more modern models are not suitable. We hope to receive ideas for possible uses for these from the local community in October.

Elected member's Report: Changes to bus services - The Balfron Glasgow service is largely unchanged but the Balfron Stirling link is even further reduced. The planning panel was meeting on Tuesday the 3rd to discuss the future of Croftamie Nursery. Bruce Reekie has been appointed as the head of 'Environment and Place' so will be a contact for issues with potholes, floods etc.

Planning and Licencing: Gladman Appeal - we responded to the Reporter's request for comments on the current appeal. The Community Council will appear at the Edenmill Appeal on extensions of hours to oppose the request .We continue to monitor the Blue Risk development following the submission of a new application. Some members of the CC attended a meeting with regards to the proposed building of 89 homes on the Killearn hospital site. Although it is outside our area the effect on traffic in the A81 is of concern.

Community Comments: The main issue raised was the need for a solution to the recent floods, which is covered elsewhere in the BVB.
