Amazing News!

To make you smile perchance to read, to watch, to knit, to natter to play and so, so much more!

Strathblane Community Development Trust (SCDT) held our AGM on Monday 30th September. We said it was going to be exciting unlike many AGMs. It was.

We announced that the SCDT Board had just agreed a minute of agreement to accept a gift to the Community of half a million pounds towards building a new community-owned library, to replace our much-loved but rapidly ageing facility. The money will be invested in the short term and interest earned will help with SCDT running costs.

Angus Graham has gifted the money with the sole condition that the library is called the Thomas Graham Library. Thomas Graham FRS, FRSE 1805-1869 is Angus' great, great uncle and a very famous chemist who lived at Ballewan. His statue is in George Square. He did pioneering work in dialysis and the diffusion of gases - Graham's Laws. He was the last non political Master of the Mint and has a building named after him at Strathclyde University.

This huge donation from Mr Graham supports SCDT's decision to seek funding for a new library, following Stirling Council's apparent move to shift funds previously allocated for a new library away to match fund its big Stirling City Region Deal project. Work starts now to raise funding for a feasibility and planning study into how we can make a new library a reality. This will include looking at suitable sites close to the school, and investigating whether other facilities such as a business hub could be incorporated into the final building. We will also be talking to Stirling Council about how a community-owned library can be operated and its running costs funded. We will, of course, be consulting the community too.

Mr Graham's donation is the best-possible start for this important project - but we still need to raise substantial further funding to make a new library a reality. If you are interested in supporting this project, please contact us scdt@strathblane.online

The AGM also agreed our priority activities in addition to the library project. We have commissioned an independent housing needs survey from Rural Housing Scotland with funding from Stirling Council so that the community knows the type of housing needed for the future and we can have our own local place plan.

Strathblane Community Council February Update

from Chair Marian Lever

October meeting

We had neither a police presence nor an elected member to report to us, nor did we receive a police report and this will be followed up, especially as there have been serious incidents requiring police attendance both in the local GPs' surgery and outside the school. However this meant that we had plenty of time to discuss the issue of flooding.

We were lucky that Maria Lucey, Bridges, Floods and Drains Co-ordinator at SC was able to attend and take part in the discussions. We were not able to hear from Scottish Water at this meeting but we have been promised attendance at our November meeting and a number of issues were raised for them to tackle when they come. We heard from one resident who has been raising issues about the burn since 2017. She has recently raised a petition to SC asking them to clarify ownership of the lands on either side of the burn and to encourage the Netherblane factors to ensure that debris does not leave their land and block the burn. We also heard about a group of local residents who have been meeting with representatives of SC to explore various issues about the flooding. This has resulted in some action (detailed in the minutes) and a good working relationship has developed. In the light of this the CC decided not to pursue a formal petition at present.

We then heard about the SCDT plans for the coming year which includes a number of projects (see the SCDT report elsewhere) which the CC voted to support. We are particularly delighted that they are organising a Housing Survey which will inform our actions on planning issues in the future. Please make sure that you take part. We were also delighted to hear of the generous offer to support the rebuilding of the library (again reported elsewhere in the BVB). We will watch this development with interest and encourage local residents to get behind the fundraising efforts that will be needed to bring this project to fruition.

At the Rural Stirling meeting we learned that the Parking Strategy discussion are not even scheduled to start in this area until December 2020 but that there are currently no plans to levy parking charges in the rural communities.

Neighbourhoods of Care discussed Respite Care in its broadest sense from Short breaks of 2/3 hours to bed based care. We were told that the rural area does not generate sufficient demand to use all the beds at Strathendrick and that despite the restrictions that having residents cause, as their needs must come first, the centre was trying to find other ways to help such as the monthly Dementia Café. We will keep you posted.

Ambulance Services in the area are still raising issues and Bruce Crawford will be approached to see what else the village can do to support our needs, especially out of hours. We will try to get a representative of the Service to attend our next meeting. See you there?

Where will you be living in 5-10 years?

Still in the village, perhaps in your present home? Or, if your family is young, you'll have moved into a rented house. And if you're at the other end of the housing spectrum, you might have downsized into a smaller retirement home.

There's only one problem: we don't have much, if any, of these types of housing in our village. As most residents know, it's not easy to find the right type of home in Strathblane and Blanefield, no matter your circumstances. Particular shortages are:

Affordable homes, such as flats, apartments or cottage-style bungalows, for rent or to-buy

Retirement houses, 2-3-bedrooms and all on one level, to buy Self-build housing plots in good locations within the village

Strathblane Community Development Trust, working in partnership with Strathblane Community Council and Stirling Council, will start tackling this long-term problem by drawing up a 10-year Local Place Plan. This will include specific proposals for new housing to meet the needs of existing residents in the long-term future. We have commissioned Rural Housing Scotland, a specialist charity that helps rural communities to tackle their housing problems, to profile your long-term needs using an online SurveyMonkey questionnaire. The online survey will go live via the village website www.strathblane.online and the Strathblane Facebook page. A paper version of the survey is included in this issue of the Bulletin – you are welcome to complete it and hand it in to the Library in Strathblane or Vishnu's ShopSmart store in Blanefield. Final completion date is November 30.

To hear more about the survey, please come along to the village's first Housing Fair on Saturday October 26 from 12-4pm in the Village Club. You'll hear expert speakers outline the many options now available for communities like ours to tackle their housing challenges. There will be an exhibition of different types of modern housing that communities like ours are increasingly developing to meet the needs of their residents, and the various forms of ownership and renting that are now available. All residents are invited to attend this free event, to help inform them of what could be possible for our village and to meet their own needs in the future.
